<u>CANDLES FOR SICK & HOUSEBOUND</u> Each week votive candles are lit by you, they last approximately 2hrs. You will have an opportunity to buy a 7 day candle which will be left either at the Sacred Heart and Our Lady's Altar for the duration of a week. The charge will be £5. A second candle will be lit for the sick and housebound. Each week a named member of the Parish will be remembered by the lighting of a candle.

<u>PRAYERS:</u> It is our duty to pray for each other, for those who are sick and those who care for them. But I also ask your prayers for the Chaplains who sit with those who will die, then with the families and then to stand at the graveside bringing the Peace of Jesus, to these broken families. I remember my good friend at Llandough, Peter Davies RC Chaplain, and Dave Pritchard at the Heath.

OPENING THE CHURCH FOR PRIVATE PRAYER: At the moment all Churches and Places of Worship in Wales are still closed. However, when permission is granted we need to be ready. We are currently following Archdiocesan Guidance and Procedures regarding the possibility of opening the Church in a very limited capacity for private prayer. Initially this would be for one hour twice a week. For this to happen we need volunteers to be available to clean, supervise and ensure that social distancing is observed and sanitiser is used. Please let me know if you would be available. If we have no volunteers, the Church unfortunately will stay closed. More information in my weekly message.

MESSAGE FROM CANON MIKE CORPUS CHRISTI

The Catholic Community of the City of Cardiff each year would meet for the famous Corpus Christi Procession through the streets of the Town. Each Parish, along with school children would walk to the Castle Grounds and there they would encounter the "Body of Christ" in Benediction. I can hear some say "Those were the days!" In later years it was opened up to the people of the Archdiocese of Cardiff. They came from all parts of South Wales to celebrate their Faith in the Body of Christ, not in Benediction, but in the MASS.

Remember when you made your First Holy Communion? Like you, I have memories of that day. Each time we meet as a Catholic Christian Community we encounter the Lord in Word and Sacrament. In one Parish I served, it was known as "The Turn Out". Turning out as a group of people showing to the onlookers the Force, the strength and the dominant presence of Catholics in the Community in which they lived. We should be seen to be living Gospel values, loving our Neighbour as ourselves and meeting each week to receive Our Lord in Holy Communion, Food for the Journey.
